ADCA TO INCORPORATE

Prompted by some concern over personal liability, work is underway to incorporate ADCA under the Iowa Nonprofit Corporation Act.

Present officers of the club will be the initial officers and directors of the corporation. All members of the club will automatically become voting members of the corporation. The annual meeting of the members will be held in September at the convention for the purpose of electing directors and for the transacting of such other business as may come before the meeting.


The name, Antique Doorknob Collectors of America (ADCA), will remain the same. The corporation will file for exemption from Federal income tax and an application will be made to allow contributions to be deductable under the Internal Revenue code.



HISTORICAL NOTES ON EMBLEMATICS FROM THE KAISER COLLECTION



In 1856 St. Paul became the first school district in the territory of Minnesota. The Reverand Edward D. Neill, a pioneer Presbyterian minister, was named secretary of the board of education and superintendent of schools. One of his contributions was a design for a seal for the St Paul Board of Education.

Niell based his design for the seal on this photograph of himself and his son Samuel.







The above knob bears the seal of the State of Minnesota and the State motto "L'Etoile Du Nord" (Star of the North) and is from the building pictured above which served as the state capital from 1883 to 1906.
