

The fifth annual convention of the A D C A will be held September 20, 21, and 22, 1985. It will take place at Noah's Ark Motor Inn and Restaurant, St. Charles, Missouri.

St. Charles is located about 25 miles (30 minutes) from St. Louis. There are lots of things to do and see in the St. Louis area so, if possible, plan on staying longer. The weather in September is usually warm (70's) but unpredicable.

1985 CONVENTION DISPLAY COMPETITION

CLASS I	METALLIC	Any metal knob or knobs, brass or iron, cast or wrought, plain or fancy	RED TAG
CLASS II	NON-METALLIC	Any material other than metal. Glass, wood, plastic, ceramic.	YELLOW TAG
CLASS III	BEST OF SHOW	Any and all displays eligible	BLUE TAG

Displays are limited in size to fit on the table-top furnished for each member (approximately 30" x 72"). Number of knobs not important, can be one or 100.

If escutcheon plates are used in combination with knobs, they must be matched sets.

All class I and II displays will include only the tagged items. Each member may bring as many entries as desired in either or both catagories.

Class I displays can be all brass, all iron, or can be a combination of both.

Class II displays can be all glass, all ceramic, or can be a mixture of various non-metallic materials.

Class III displays will include the entire display of the member.

A numbered tag of appropriate color will be furnished for each display.

Voting will be done by tag color, number, and name of member. Ballots will be distributed at the convention.

Ballots will be counted prior to the public open house, and award plaques will be presented to the winning displays.

Traders and items for sale will not be included in the displays, but should be arranged attractively and marked as such.

Item from the East Liverpool, Ohio "Evening Review"

An event called the "doorknob toss" will be brought back as an activity of the 18th annual Tri-State Pottery Festival - and a local pottery will have to begin manufacturing porcelain doorknobs again so participants will have something to toss.

Homer Laughlin China Co. worker Harold "Sonny" Rayle said the event was last held in 1978 or 1979 and was discontinued because nobody makes porcelain doorknobs anymore. The last time the event was staged, workers waded out in the Ohio River to dig old, rejected doorknobs out of the riverbottom.

Rayle showed the association a doorknob blank which Homer Laughlin will make especially for the competition.

In the toss, participants toss doorknobs into one-pound coffee cans from a distance of 30 feet.

CLUB KNOB DESIGN CONTEST PARTICULARS

After due consideration, an advisory panel unanamously established the September convention date as the deadline for accepting entries for the club knob design contest.

The prize for the winning entry, membership and convention registration for one year, should be sufficient inducement, that even the least artistic among us will be motivated to submit an entry! The winner need not attend the convention to claim the prize.

Membership voting on the entries will occur at the convention, followed immediately by counting of the ballots and announcement of the winner.

The winning design will not automatically become the club logo, but could qualify at the time the membership votes on an official logo.


The following entries, submitted by a club member, were self-labeled "doodles" but certainly are worthy of the consideration they will receive as bona-fide entries. Eight entries have been received to date. Remember, more than 1 design may be submitted per person.

Last months hint was that the club's initials might conceivably form part of the design - this months hint, well-taken, submitted by a discerning member, is that the rank and file outside doorknob circles would not be able to decipher the initials, and that the club name, in full in the design, might better serve the club.

I regret that Charles Wardell's name, as being a co-worker on this project, was inadvertantly omitted in the announcement of the contest.

Because of the deadline date and this being the last newsletter before the convention, and the determination to move ahead quickly with the project, it will not be possible to print all of the entries for the entire membership's vote before the selection of the winning design.

Just how in the world could I follow Art Paholke, with his fabulous collection? Well, I can't. By far his is the most outstanding collections I've seen. So instead, I'll have to tell just how I started with the following,



DOORKNOB COLLECTING by Loretta Nemec

Throughout life everyone collects something. Be it rubber bands on the doorknob, or buttons. As a child we start picking up fascinating rocks found in our backyard. When going to the beach we can't resist picking up an interesting shell, from one shell to another until we have our fill. At home we separate our treasure. Do we stop or does our quest continue into the library?

As a twelve year old child I was impressed by a little black jet knob with its rose and escutcheon plate, all the way to the matching hinges on the doors of my mother's house. After getting married and buying our first house in 1955, I realized that no longer was there any craftsmanship put into the

"Modern House." Gone was the skeleton key. The key hole was replaced by a doorknob with a little hole in it for the key. We were MODERNIZING.

I longed for the little black jet knob. With a little encouragement, I got the knob, rose, plate and hinges from my mother, which satisfied me for a long time. Years passed, my parents were gone, the house in Chicago is decaying with age, but I still have the knob tucked away amoung my souveniers. In reminiscing, I brought out the knob and put it on display with a few straw flowers and a little black ribbon on the shank. Gradually, I picked up a few more knobs to decorate and give to friends. Soon, others caught my eyes, from white porcelain to the brown pottery, to glass, to brass. Yes, the quest was on. Friends started bringing me doorknobs. Soon they were on display on shelves, tables and window sills. It was a conversation piece instantly when anyone entered my house.

I thought I was the only one collecting doorknobs, much to my surprise I ran across an Anita Gold's column that mentioned there had been a book available on antique doorknobs, by Maude Eastwood. I couldn't wait till the book arrived. I will always be thankful to Maude for publishing that first book, and to Arnie Fredrick for all his efforts in getting the first gathering of collectors in 1981 and spear headed the orginazation of the Antique Doorknob Collector's club.

What started out as a retirement hobby seems to have jumped the gun. I presently am doing my retirement dream along with being a full time secretary for Fermi Laboratory, a wife to Ray for 30 years, mother of four grown children and grandmother of one. My husband and children have been helpful in my search, along with fellow workers who have found knobs for me. (On one occasion had brought an entire five panel door into the office just so I could have the knob)

My favorite knob is the one I found in a little antique shop in Oswego, Ill. It is a solid 14 oz. brass knob with the vermiel bee on it. It originally came from Belgium. In researching it, apparently when Napoleon became emperor he picked the bee as his symbol for industry, hard work, dedication and team work, hence the bee was used to decorate practically everything. The bee knob could have come from any one of the palaces Napoleon used in Versailles, Malmaison, Compiegne, St. Cloud, Rambouillet, or Fontainebleau or any one of the palaces of his Marshals. My search also took me to the Napoleonic Society in Florida, and countless books. (Next to Christ, Napoleon has had the most works written about him.) My search will not be complete until I find out where this knob came from.



A tapistry, once in Bonaparte's study at the Tuileries and now at Malmaison, is rich in Napoleonic and Roman imperial symbolism: eagles, imperial crowns, laurel wreaths, his monogram and bees.

Another favorite knob is the "Indian" that reportedly came from the Mizpah Hotel.


I feel there must be a story behind the Indian as there would be for any figural knob.

Additional documentation would be most welcome.


This porcelain knob with the National Fire Insurance Company name embossed in it, came from a fireman who collects antique fire fighting equipment.

This I believe, is a fairly rare type of proprietary knob.





Glass knobs also turn my fancy, I would love to add a Waterford crystal knob to my collection.



What I enjoy most are the wonderful people I have met through collecting and being a member of the club. The club has opened numerous DOORS for me, and as John Holland once said, "doorknob collectors are the cadillac of collectors."

As for the size of my collection, I would place myself as one of the smaller collectors. I have about 300 knobs. To those who have small collections, it's not the amount of knobs you possess, it's more the knowledge you have acquired from collecting them.

Collecting to me is like hunting: I never quite know what I'll find. The search is satisfying enough. It's not what it's worth in dollars. It's the pride of ownership.....It's priceless.
