

The winners received an engraved brass plaque.





### **Restoration Column**

Five small copper colored bronze escutcheon plates are still needed for the Bennet House of the Dalles, Ore. No knobs.

For the Kamm house: Still needed, 4 or 5 hammered bronze or brass knobs and 2 escutcheon plates.



Also for the Kamm house, 2 or more knobs and 4 or 5 plates in the "basket weave" design.

Nine pair of hinges. No design. 5½ x 5½, not including steeples. For old church.

Four pair Hemacite (composition, appearing to have sawdust content). Also 6 pair roses and key escutheons for same old church.







Any number less than that required are welcome, for any of the above.

Remember, we are not asking that you rob your collection, nor to donate. Respond only if any of the above pieces are expendable from your stock. If you can contribute, contact-Maudie Eastwood,


John Holland, as a result of a 3 case, 225 Knob and plate display in a local library, was invited to participate in a collector display at the Phoenix Art Museum, from April 2nd to July 14th. Museum representatives viewed his collection with a discerning eye, sellected 25 of his finest pieces, among them, the Doggie, the Lion and the Standing Indian. John is one of our more active "pushers" of the dignity of our mission.

Maudie Eastwood was approached by the directors of a Tillamook library for a three week showing of a full case exhibit, with the time extended, due to public interest. (Both Maudie and John state that a high degree of youth interest was unexpectedly shown.) Maudie also conducted an hour long slide show for an antique study group on the fine points of antique hardware collecting. She later set up a large knob and plate display in a 290 room retirement center, where she was featured on a 20 minute in-house T V program.





## Later Renaissance

# Ornament in France.



uring the reign of Louis XIII - 1610 to 1643, the Italian influence still shows clearly. The cartouche, generous in scale, often grotesque and with heavy fruit pendants, was in vouge.

The wreath, ribbons, cherub and masque are frequently used. The eye is struck with a certain generosity of relief and breadth of surface on modeled surfaces. The broken curve is used in consoles with the acanthus on the face.

Earlier work in the Louis XIV reign (1643 - 1715), is along the same lines as that of the time of Louis XIII, but with the rising glory and influence of Louis XIV, the pomp and splender of his court increased and reflected itself in the products of all branches of art. A studied elegance was evident such as would please one of the most cultivated and luxurious courts in Europe.


At the height of its development, there is left only a faint relationship with the Antique, in the sumptious art of the Louis XIV era. The artists of the period, borrowing from the Classic merely trifling details, created ornamentation by their own genius and with French elegance and grace.


In much of the ornamental design of this epoch, the artists show a very marked preference for mouldings or bead-like features encircling the whole or part of the design, often forming diaper or scroll patterns.

The "shell" begins to figure prominently in almost every design, deteriorating toward the end of the period into that flowing and fantastic ornament called "Rocaille" or "Rococo", which flourished under the reign of Louis XV.









