... Victorian, that is.



Did you know that from the late 1890s to 1940 you could buy a precut house from Sears Roebuck and Company? if you lived helpful railroad siding, for obvious reasons. Did you want your precut with an indoor bath? In they started at \$310. Other options included built-in china closets and, of course, with hardware a choice finishes.

The Victorian theme, the Sears precut houses and the convention theme of Chicago Hardware Manufacturing Company was interlaced throughout the four or five days.

On Friday, Lillian led an auto caravan that pinpointed several Sears precuts and other historical points of interest in and around Elgin. Lillian's portable bull horn aided her (on-the-spot) talks and got occasional reactions from the locals.

Kane County flea market attracted many on Saturday. A number of our members are regular fixtures there.


By Sunday morning it was down to business with display judging prior to the segment which was "open-to-the-public".

Education is a corner stone of our organization and was heavily emphasized on Monday with four presentations.

Charles Bednar ADCA's (note-not Charles Bednar) of the Gifford Park Association gave slide presentation. Just 13 years ago, much of Gifford Park was the "other" side town in Elgin. The association raised interest in the run-down part of town and was instrumental in defining the Elgin Historical District. Before and slides after were startling as multiple family dwellings were returned to single family homes with more appropriate Victorian color schemes...a lesson in neighborhood rebirths.

Jeanette Field Sears presented the precuts. The 450 models of houses offered are now compiled in a book with prices and specs...sort of a "Field Guide" (pun intended). Thousands

of precuts exist today and a trip to the attic or the basement to note the numbered rafters or joists will verify a house's origin. According to Jeanette, the Sears guarantee on these houses was unsurpassed.

The President the Elgin Museum Association, Christian Schock, chronicled the History of Elgin, Illinois. There was a time when to much of the world for Elgin stood quality. The highest grade of butter was "Elgin Quality" and, of course, the quality of the Elgin watch was well known, Schock traced of the growth the city from 1892 when the watch company employed 2,800, very high number for the then small community. The town fought back from several economic depressions and the introduction of margarine to its present balance of industry.

Our own members "stood us well" Arnie Fredrick gave a slide presentation mechanical on door bells. This is worthy of an article in the news letter and I will only say that is was an excellent and informative presentation.


An opportunity to help

A post-convention visit to the 1890-1925 location of the Barrows Lock Company created an opportunity for the ADCA to exercise a mandate to aid in the education and preservation of historic builders' hardware.


Ray and Loretta Nemec and Maude Eastwood visited the site at the urging of member Richard Wise. They were gratified to find the main building restored, in use, and plans for further restoration of adjacent buildings.

Barrows, acquired by Yale & Towne in 1925, was moved from the Lockport location, 32 miles southwest of Chicago, around 1932, therefore,60 years later, little memory and few artifacts were left to proclaim the going concern Barrows had been. ADCA might well make an offer of its









services to augment the modest collection of **Barrows** artifacts found and displayed on site.

An unofficial, on-the-spot suggestion was made to locate and make available on a loan basis, the metallic Barrows knobs and plates illustrated on pages 102 and 103 in Antique Builders' Hardware. Also, the dearth of Barrows historical and definitive material at the local library makes the offer of a copy from our Archives of the 1925 Barrows catalog seem advisable.

Expect more on this opportunity in a later edition of *The Doorknob Collector*.


