- Places of Interest: We list four museums and have links to their websites. If you know of other **non-profit** museums that feature hardware or architectural items, please let us know and we will contact them about a link from our website.
- Calendar of Events: This page features local events of interest to our membership and the general public. Please let us know of any local happenings in your area. You do not need to be personally involved in the event. Just send the information to me so that I can get it up on the website in a timely manner.
- Newsletter Archives: Currently old newsletters (Dec 1981 through Nov-Dec 2003) are available for download. We will continue to prepare later issues, but the most current ones will not be available.
- Antique Catalog Orders: All of the catalogs available through our Archives are listed. Non-members pay a 15% premium on their purchases. You may print a paper copy of the order form and mail it to the address listed along with a check or order them directly on the computer using a PayPal or credit card.
- **Book Peddler:** Similarly, the books available through the club may be purchased by printing out the order form and mailing your order with a check or purchasing directly on the website. Again non-members pay a 15% premium.



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• The Resource Directory: Members who choose a business membership for \$100 per year have information about their business plus a link to their website posted here. Others who choose a Web Listing membership for \$50 per year have information about their business listed at the bottom without a link.

What is American Aesthetic Hardware?

The theme of the Convention Is American Aesthetic Hardware, 1875-1895. Wonderful, you might say, but what is that? It is not so easy to define an artistic style, but here goes:

The "aesthetic" movement sought to use artistic designs to decorate everyday objects. Unlike the hardware that went before it, (helmeted warriors, animals or abstract ornamentation), the aesthetic style generally used two-dimensional surface ornamentation, and decoration derived from nature – flowers, vines, birds, owls and the like, often strikingly asymmetrical. It is exemplified by Japanesque designs, such as R&E's geisha suite or Sargent's ekado design. Nashua was another prime producer of aesthetic hardware, and even Corbin produced some. The broken leaf pattern is another example. By the way, the reference to "abstract ornamentation" does not refer to modern abstract design, such as Mondrian or Pollock, but to the non-representation swirls and such of Victorian hardware before 1880.

Is that clear enough?
